The Acts of the Holy Spirit

(Introduction)

Scripture Concentration

"...I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen." Acts 1:1-2

Back Ground of the Book

Jesus prophesied to his disciples that the works He did, they would do greater¹. This prophecy is fulfilled in the book of Acts commonly referred to as the Acts of the Apostles. A more correct title for the book is "the Acts of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Apostles."

The book of Acts is the second part of a two part series, written by Luke; a Gentile, physician and Paul's traveling partner. Luke's first writing is the gospel that bears his name. He writes to inform the church of "all that Jesus began to do and teach." The book of acts begins with the ascension of Jesus and shares the rapid spread of the gospel beyond the Jewish community to the entire world. Luke does not provide a complete history of the New Testament Church, but of the significant events and encounters that he experienced while traveling with the Apostle Paul.

The book of Acts serves as a bridge between the works of Christ and the wonders of the apostles. Acts completes the story of the gospel. He shows how a new community arose from the life, teachings and death of Jesus, and thus provides the backdrop for the latter writings in the book.

The book of Acts is the 44th book of the Bible. It has 28 chapters 1,007 versus 24,250 words. Over next five weeks we will read one chapter a day, and spend approximately 15 minutes in devotion, as we seek to "Honor Our Past, and Elevate Our Future."

Questions to Ponder

- 1. In the book of Acts, Luke wrote about the power, people and the practices of the New Testament Church. If he was to write about today's church, what would he say? What would he say about Zion Baptist Church? What would he say about you?
- 2. If you were one of the original disciples, and God said, "ye shall be my witnesses in Portsmouth, Chesapeake, Norfolk, Hampton, Virginia Beach, Virginia, the United States, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth, How and where would you begin?"
- 3. How well are you equipped for the task?

Scripture Concentration

Observation

The words of Jesus throughout Scripture were of great value, but for the disciples, those words were priceless. After conquering death, hell and the grave, Jesus gave his disciples their final instructions. Jesus told them that they would be His witnesses in Jerusalem and throughout the neighboring community until they reached the entire world for Him. But this could only take place if they were empowered by the Holy Spirit.

What the disciples accomplished in the New Testament was nothing less than phenomenal. But this was accomplished because of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in their lives individually and collectively.

The calling and commission on today's disciples and church is as significant today, as it was in New Testament times. And like the New Testament Church, we must be empowered by the Holy Spirit in our personal lives as we are in our spiritual lives.

Questions to Ponder?

- 1. The work of Christ requires the entire church to possess the power of the Holy Spirit. As a church are we walking in that power? If yes, what are the evidences, if not, what must be done for us to walk in that power?
- 2. The work of Christ requires each member of the church to possess the power of the Holy Spirit. Are you waking in that power personally? If yes, what evidence do you have? If not, what do you need to do to walk in that power?

Glossary

All things in common

All things in common conveys that the early Christians did not live in a commune, or pool and redistribute everything equally, but that they held their own possessions lightly, ready to be used for someone else, as the needs arose.

Sold their Possessions

The selling of their possessions indicates that they sold their own possessions to provide money for those of the church who were in need.

The Apostles Doctrine

The Scripture is what was meant by the Apostles Doctrine. It was the foundational content and knowledge essential for the spiritual growth and development of the believer in Christ.

Scripture Concentration

The unparalleled and unprecedented growth experienced in the book of Acts didn't come without challenges. One such challenge was developing the next generation of believers. The ultimate responsibility of the church is to provide opportunity for spiritual growth and leadership opportunities for the new believer in Christ.

In the New Testament, this task was accomplished by leaders of the new movement, not by the priest, Levites, or religious officials of that day. They went from house to house, eating, fellowshipping, and instructing the new believer in the ways of God.

The model used by the New Testament church, is a good model to use now. Instead of expecting pastors and preachers to do all the preaching, teaching, and ministering, the church must develop learning circles and covenant communities to foster growth and development in the life of the new believer. The church needs you to fulfill its mission.

Questions to Ponder?

- 1. What was the most meaningful Christian gathering that you had the pleasure to attend? What made it so meaningful? If you could have changed something about it, what would you change?
- 2. If you had the responsibility to plan a fun and life changing activities for new Christians, what kind of activity would it be? What would it take to get it from the planning stages to the implementation stage? Pray earnestly to make it happen.

Glossary

<u>Galileans</u>

Galileans were inhabitants of the mostly rural area of northern Israel around the Sea of Galilee.

Devout Men

Devout Men, or God fearing Jews refer to the Hebrew males who made the pilgrimage to Jerusalem. They were expected to celebrate Pentecost in Jerusalem, as part of observing the Jewish religious calendar.

Filled with the Spirit

Being filled with the Spirit, contrasts the baptism with the Spirit, which is the one-time act by which God places believers into His body, the filling is a repeated reality of Spiritcontrolled behavior that God commands believers to maintain.

Prayer

Lord, fill me with your Spirit! In Jesus Name I pray. Amen. "One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the time of prayer—at three in the afternoon. Now a man who was lame from birth was being carried to the temple gate called Beautiful, where he was put every day to beg from those going into the temple courts. When he saw Peter and John about to enter, he asked them for money. Peter looked straight at him, as did John. Then Peter said, "Look at us!" So the man gave them his attention, expecting to get something from them. Then Peter said, "Silver or gold I do not have, but what I do have I give you. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, walk." Taking him by the right hand, he helped him up, and instantly the man's feet and ankles became strong. He jumped to his feet and began to walk. Then he went with them into the temple courts, walking and jumping, and praising God. When all the people saw him walking and praising God,"

Observation

It was an ugly site at a beautiful gate. A man lame from birth was brought to the temple to beg on a daily basis. They didn't have disability benefits, social security, or any government assistance. He came daily because of the generosity of the people of God.

On the occasion of our Scripture Concentration, the lame man requested of Peter and John to give him alms, or money. The disciples responded, "silver and gold, we do not have, but what we do have we will give you. In the name of Jesus of Nazareth, rise up and walk." The disciples gave the lame man something more than dollars and cents. The disciples gave the lame man value. They gave him a will to walk again. And once he received the will to walk, it was easy for him to receive the power to walk.

Our ministry and call is one of value. We fulfill our ministry responsibility not by focusing on the disability or comforting the disabled in their disability. We fulfill our responsibility to minister when we share God's message of hope and value. We fulfill our responsibility when the people regain their will and power to walk. Our responsibility is fulfilled when they regain their will to live, and to live life more abundantly.

Questions to Ponder?

- 1. Survey your life, what are the things that are working? What's missing? How do you add the spiritual ingredients necessary to make your life complete?
- 2. The work of Christ requires each member of the church to possess the power of the Holy Spirit. Are you walking in that power personally? If yes, what evidence do you have? If not, what do you need to do to walk in that power?

<u>Glossary</u>

Uneducated and untrained

The people were amazed at Peter and John, because despite the fact they were not educated in the rabbinical schools and had no formal training in Old Testament Theology, they were able to preach and teach with power and authority.

<u>Council</u>

The council refers to the Sanhedrin. It served as the Jews' national ruling body and their supreme court. It was made up of 71 members and the High Priest.

<u>Prayer</u>

Scripture Concentration

"And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and of one soul: neither said any of them that ought of the things which he possessed was his own; but they had all things common. And with great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus: and great grace was upon them all. Neither was there any among them that lacked: for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the prices of the things that were sold, And laid them down at the apostles' feet: and distribution was made unto every man according as he had need. And Joses, who by the apostles was surnamed Barnabas, (which is, being interpreted, The son of consolation,) a Levite, and of the country of Cyprus, Having land, sold it, and brought the money, and laid it at the apostles' feet."

Acts 4:32-37

Observation

One of the challenges caused by the creation of new and upstart ministries is that they often become a magnet or seedbed for a multiplicity of needs. Such was also the case with the New Testament Church.

But Peter and the rest of the group used this opportunity to create a caring and sharing community that advanced God's kingdom agenda. Through the use of resources, (material and immaterial), people were drawn to the love that became the trademark of that new community.

This new community established a noble precedent by selling their possessions, and using the proceeds to meet the needs of the members in their fellowship. They reached in, to reach out so that ultimately everyone was able to reach up. This act of unprecedented generosity and stewardship left an indelible mark and positive impact on the believers and nonbelievers of that day. We need that same kind of love and community today. That's the kind of love Jesus was talking about when he said, "by this shall all men know that you are my disciples" (John 13:35).

Questions to Ponder

- 1. In what areas of your life do you feel an overabundance of God's blessings? How are you able to share those blessings?
- 2. What are some of the needs experienced in your family, community, and church? How has God called you to fulfill some of those needs?

Apostle

Lord, help me to live a life that others will want to follow in my footsteps. "But a certain man named Ananias, with Sapphira his wife, sold a possession, And kept back part of the price, his wife also being privy to it, and brought a certain part, and laid it at the apostles' feet. But Peter said, Ananias, why hath Satan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost, and to keep back part of the price of the land? Whiles it remained, was it not thine own? and after it was sold, was it not in thine own power? why hast thou conceived this thing in thine heart? thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God. And Ananias hearing these words fell down, and gave up the ghost: and great fear came on all them that heard these things. And the young men arose, wound him up, and carried him out, and buried him. And it was about the space of three hours after, when his wife, not knowing what was done, came in. And Peter answered unto her, Tell me whether ye sold the land for so much? And she said, Yea, for so much. Then Peter said unto her, How is it that ye have agreed together to tempt the Spirit of the Lord? behold, the feet of them which have buried thy husband are at the door, and shall carry thee out. Then fell she down straightway at his feet, and yielded up the ghost: and the young men came in, and found her dead and, carrying her forth, buried her by her husband. And great fear came upon all the church, and upon as many as heard these things."

Acts 5:1-11

The death of Ananias and Sapphira brought fear and trembling to the New Testament Church. The supernatural move of God secured truth, honesty and integrity within this rapidly growing church community. Ananias and Sapphira failed in the financial commitment, not because of their inability to pay, but rather they defaulted on their commitment and promise to God.

The failed financial commitment elevated the simple sale of a family home, and a financial pledge to the church's capital campaign into a murder investigation. The cause of death proves more telling than how they died. The cause of death was lying to the Holy Spirit. Ananias and Sapphira pledge was voluntary, but their grandstanding was deadly. They thought they were lying to Peter, but the untruth that they told was to God.

As we stumble through life trying to find our purpose, we are called, not to follow the pressure placed on us by our peers, but to have an authentic commitment and relationship with God. We don't have to lie to men; we only have to trust and be true to God.

Questions to Ponder

- 1. Name a time when someone made a commitment to you, but reneged. How did it make you feel? How did you respond to the individual? What happened the next time they made a commitment? If they were to make a commitment today, how would you respond?
- 2. Name a time when you made a commitment to someone and you had to renege. How did you feel? How did you make it up to them? Name a time when you promised God something, but did not deliver. How did you feel? How do you think God felt?

Growing Pains

Scripture Concentration

And in those days, when the number of the disciples was multiplied, there arose a murmuring of the Grecians against the Hebrews, because their widows were neglected in the daily ministration. Then the twelve called the multitude of the disciples unto them, and said, It is not reason that we should leave the word of God, and serve tables. Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business. But we will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word. And the saying pleased the whole multitude: and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost, and Philip, and Prochorus, and Nicanor, and Timon, and Parmenas, and Nicolas a proselyte of Antioch: Whom they set before the apostles: and when they had prayed, they laid their hands on them. And the word of God increased; and the number of the disciples multiplied in Jerusalem greatly; and a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith.

Acts 6:1-7

Observation

Growing pains has been described as the physical, emotional, or organizational pain, discomfort, or distress experienced as a result of the growing process. Such growing pains are not limited to the physical body, emotional psyche, or a secular organization. The sixth chapter of the book of Acts proves that the church can also be afflicted with growing pains.

Along with phenomenal growth, came individual desires, preferences, prejudices, and favoritism. This led to the neglect of the Grecian widows, a problem that threatened to future of the New Testament Church. Churches aren't immune to differences. What makes them distinct is how they handle their differences.

In an unprecedented move, the disciples chose not to handle the problems themselves, but rather to empower the others to select leaders who met the minimal qualifications of possessing the Holy Spirit, wisdom, and a godly reputation. Because the problem was handled correctly, the Bible says that "the Word of God increased and the number of disciples multiplied greatly." **Questions to Ponder?**

1. What "growing pains" have you encountered in the last two years as a result of membership growth in the church? Have these issues been resolved? What took place (or need to take place) for its resolution?

2. The leadership chosen to rectify the problem was chosen in part because of the leadership qualifications they possessed. Do you possess the same qualifications? Are those same qualifications needed today? Are there other qualifications need? If so, which ones??

<u>Glossary</u>

Hellenist Jews

The Hellenistic Jews formerly lived outside of Judea and Galilee and came to settle in their homeland of Jerusalem. They spoke Greek.

Hebraic Jews

The Hebraic Jews and were born in Jerusalem or Judea, and spoke mainly Aramaic.

Proselytes

Full converts that was instructed in Judaism, baptized and circumcised.

God-fearers

Converts who worshipped and studied in the synagogues, but were not circumcised.

Freedmen

Freedmen were former slaves (or their children) who had been emancipated by their owners.
