On March 8, 1971, my mother, Janet Andrews, had a nice surprise and reward for me. She took me to see Muhammad Ali and Joe Frazier fight at the Capital Theater in Portsmouth. The fight was televised per satellite from Madison Square Garden. Ali and Frazier were the first black boxers to draw a multi-million-dollar event. I liked both boxers, Ali for his astonishing speed and brilliant footwork and Frazier because he was like an attack dog--- he would keep coming at you.

As I grew older, I continued to follow Muhammad Ali as he fought for social justice and civil rights. Muhammad Ali said, "when you saw me in the ring fighting, it wasn't just so I could beat my opponent. My fighting had a purpose. I had to be successful in order to get people to listen to the things I had to say....I wanted to be a champion who was accessible to everyone. I hope to inspire other to take control of their lives and to live with pride and self-determination." He had a great influence on the black organizers of the Civil Rights Movement. His power as a heroic symbol brought together the entire span of the movement's theological spectrum.

Joshua 1:6-9, God told Joshua three times to be strong and of good courage. Joshua had the awesome task of leading the people of Israel into the promise land. As believers of Jesus Christ, we should be willing to stand up for what we believe.
